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Statement of historical significance and description of property:

A986

"Oh, that was a beautiful house", says 80-year old Mrs. Reyne. And it is maintained so the exterior is much the same, though the interior has been modified.

A two-story rural vernacular house with a front bay and side entry, the basic shape is a T. Siding is drop with corner boards and wide fascia, windows are double-hung one-over-one sash with plain frames. The medium gable roof has boxed overhanging eaves. The side porch has a hipped roof and turned posts with decorative brackets. The eave brackets on the Italianate bay are decorative; there are also recessed panels below these windows. The trim is painted in contrasting colors to accentuate ornamental elements. The Italianate bay and rear extension also have hip roofs. There is a central chimney.

On February 20, 1877, Samuel and Mahala Cozine sold a 60-acre portion of their land claim to Lucretia Storey for \$700. Storey and her husband appear to have built a house on the property in 1878 and sold it later that year for the sum of \$2,000 to T.B. Carey. The property changed hands many times, and was held longest by the heirs of Joseph H. Hodge (1890-1901), by Charles J. and Mary Skinner (1901-1936), and by Erling and Katherine Thompson (1942-1951).

The present owner, Rick Connell, has found pages from 1881 <u>Vanity Fair</u> on the walls.

Lucretia Storey is daughter of Samuel and Mahala Cozine.

Thompson Park was created from a portion of the original 60-acre parcel (information received November 19, 2009).
