Statement of historical significance and description of property:

B365

This two-story Italianate hip roof home has a one-story east facing gable wing with brick chimney piercing the gable end. Probably built in 1885.

The roof covering is of newer composition shingles in excellent condition and the roof forms a slight overhang with curved bracketed supports. The exterior of the home is then, plain, wood shakes, also in good condition.

Forming a carport on the west side is a smaller end facing gable roof with squared support columns on rear only and extending from that gable is a flat roof addition acting as a cover now for a wood storage area somewhat destroying the architectural integrity. A rear facing shed roof extension on the east side has also probably been a later addition and is not in keeping with the architecture.

The structure sits on a concrete foundation and seems to be in excellent condition; probably housed a basement.

The one-story wing houses the front entry, and the roof forms the porch covering extending across the front of two-story portion. The shrubbery is now covering the lower window second story portion.

This was originally built as a barn for the O.O. Hodson House next door on Sixth and Davis. The David Turners bought it in 1918—it had been converted to a home prior to that date.
