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Statement of historical significance and description of property:

B486 – State Special Assessment Program

Jack Spence came to McMinnville from Scotland. He worked for Miller Mercantile, then housed in the Wright Building. He married the daughter of prominent McMinnville lawyer and property owner, Frank W. Fenton and eventually came to own a number of properties himself. This building was erected on the site of a burned structure around 1925.

The building is a simple brick structure, two stories high, facing south on Third Street between Davis and Evans. Four pairs of plain recessed double-hung one-over-one sash windows stretch across the façade at the second story level. The roofline is straight and only slightly defined three courses of common bond, and diminutive raised diamond shapes make up the modes ornament. The ground floor of the façade has two storefronts and a wide uncovered stairwell opening. Stucco, contemporary brick, and aluminum windows of varying sizes have altered and interrupted the cohesiveness.

The rear elevation is common bond red brick, and four bays across – paired inset doublehung windows stretch across the upper floor. One door opens into the alley and several openings have been blocked.

The building presently houses a bar, a restaurant, and four apartments upstairs.
