Statement of historical significance and description of property:

B490.1

An elk's head without antlers holds a dominant position at the upper center of the façade of this one-story rectangular brick building on concrete daylight basement foundation. The bilaterally symmetrical façade consisting of seven bays faces east on Evans Street between 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Streets. It is sided in a variegated brick in running bond. The parapet steps up symmetrically and frames a clock in its semicircular center. Window cavities feature ornamental fluted cast stone in the upper two thirds of the opening. The double door entry, framed by cast stone panels with swag and incised letters, is accessed by a symmetrical double staircase with an aqua-colored car raga glass partial front wall and industrial pipe hand rails. Flashing, basement and window trim are painted aqua to match the glass tile.

A cornerstone plaque bears the inscription B.P.O.E. 1283, 1937-38. The building was erected on the site of a former livery stable.
