Statement of historical significance and description of property:

B50

This two-story box has craftsman bungalow detailing. It has a medium gable roof with an east facing dormer (the house is oriented north/south). The south facing entry porch is on the west side of the façade and has a gable pediment roof with exposed beams and rafters and medium wide vergeboards, resting on square columns with recessed bevels. The porch has open railing. Stair rails are wrought iron. Window sash are typically 6/6 double hung. There is a three-window bay with shed roof to the east of the entry porch. The upstairs windows have shutters. Siding on the first floor is clapboard; above are wide cedar shingles. A belt course separates them. The gables are stucco and half-timber. There is a recent addition of narrow brick facing on the lower west side. There is a wide shed roof porch on the east side with double doors. Its detailing is similar to the south porch. On the rear of the north side is a windowed second story sleeping porch with unusually wide overhanging eaves.

The massing of this house is imposing. The cross gables are wide and deep and rise a full two and one-half stories. The chimney is just off center.
