Statement of historical significance and description of property:

B767

This two-story, basically square-shaped home has a cross gable roof of asphalt shingles with a pediment dormer. The siding is coved, the foundation is cement. There is a full basement with outside cellar steps on the west side.

The window treatment is double hung sash with shelf, front leaded. On the west side are two projected squares with decorative brackets enclosing large windows. There is a one pillared front porch with an off center oblong glass door with beautiful brass hardware. The brass doorknobs are throughout the house.

There is a small rear porch enclosed with cross slats. Single car garage. One center brick chimney.

The yard is nicely landscaped and enclosed with a chain link fence.

The property at one time was adjacent to where the Catholic Church stood. The present owner's son, while digging in the yard, discovered old wine, whiskey, and ale bottles which had been buried in rose about three feet down by the priests. Over 300 bottles have been found so far.
