Statement of historical significance and description of property:

B769

This corner lot two-story gable-roofed rural vernacular sits on a corner lot and has immense old trees all round. Italianate influence shows in the two-story bay window which projects from the south elevation. A one-story ell with a lean-to attached forms a T to the north. A later porch with plain square columns and simple balustrade is attached to the west elevation, has a hip roof and covers the entry which opens into the ell. Siding is V-grooved horizontal, corner boards, breeze boards, and rake boards are plain as are the eaves. The foundation is brick.

Fenestration is not regular, but all windows are one-over-one double hung sash with cornice moulding. The bay, the home's only ornament, has a hip roof within the main roof, three separate cornice lines, consoles above the first floor windows, and inset molded panels above the water table.
