Report in Brief:

This work session is to give the Council and public an update into the work happening with the City's \$7,718,600 allocation of State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF), the component of the \$1.9 trillion American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) package targeted to support the efforts of local governments to respond to and recover from the negative impacts of the coronavirus pandemic.

Discussion:

The following paragraphs summarize the content of today's work session discussion.

Session Objectives 1 and 2: Status updates

Review currently approved projects with their estimated budgets, all of which fit into the three categories of projects:

- Innovative High-Impact
- Immediate-Impact Community
- Internal Efficiency and Effectiveness

The project summaries include information on project phase (planning, active and complete), budget status and any proposed funding updates to the project.

Session Objective 3: Project spotlights

Describe current project statistics and outcomes for two of the 28 approved projects.

Session Objective 4: Options for utilization of remaining ARPA dollars

In November 2021, after a series of discussions with the Budget Committee, Council approved 28 projects for spending with a maximum total budget of \$6,698,000, leaving just over \$1 million in future allocations to be approved. Options for fully utilizing the city's ARPA allocation include:

- 1. Adopt updated budgets for individual approved projects (in total this adds up to approximately \$300,000)
- 2. Bring the Budget Committee, and ultimately the Council, a selection of new projects to consider for funding (approaches for coming up with this list will be explored during the discussion)

Staff has a strong confidence level that there will be little to zero risk that the city would be forced to return any unspent funds remaining as we are running up to the project's initial closing date of December 31, 2024, for a number of reasons. Flexibility is built into the ARPA grant generally. The city is eligible to use over \$6 million of its total allocation for revenue recovery. McMinnville's status as a recipient of less than \$10 million total funding means lower financial and programmatic reporting hurdles.

Session Objective 5: Discussion of Options

Discuss options for allocating the remaining ARPA dollars. Staff is looking for feedback as to which path makes the most sense to the Budget Committee.

The second attachment lists the ARPA projects as proposed in the fall of 2021 that were not approved at that time. This list is illustrative and no new projects which could be considered are included. Further, the circumstances for any number of the proposals listed may have changed and additional funding needs would go through a re-evaluation process. Finally, it is a certainty that project budgets would need to be re-worked to factor in current cost projections, a shorter project duration, etc.

The attached draft resolution outlines a near term action that could be taken to update project budgets for the currently approved projects.

Other Grant Information:

Next steps with compliance include filing our second annual report due by April 30, 2023. Grant staff will complete project description updates and project phase definitions along with updated timelines as we work through the reporting process. As our financial and programmatic reporting and tracking systems are now established, grant staff will play point on managing the allocation process for the balance of the ARPA funds and will assist in project management support of select projects.

Fiscal Impact:

These discussions will ultimately determine how the City utilizes the one-time funding from now through December 2024 (obligated) and December 2026 (expensed).

Discovery Meadows Splash Pad

Project Overview

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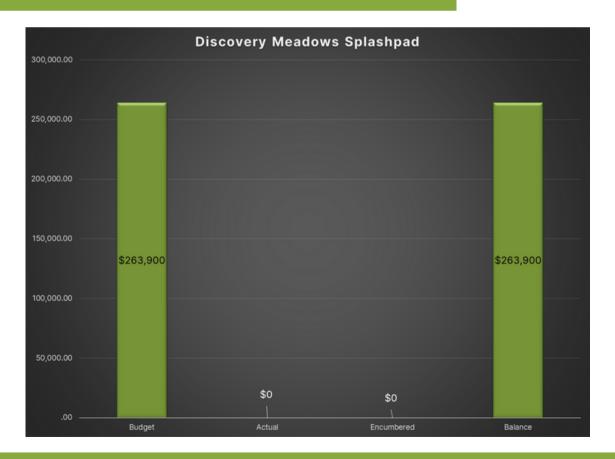
This project is to fund needed renovations to the Discovery Meadows splash pad. Constructed in 2005, this park feature is heavily visited and attracts multiple visitors to Discovery Meadows Park. The work would include renovating the mechanical system, filtration, water quality components, control elements and plaza.

The splash pad is operated seasonally each year from Memorial Day through Labor Day. It is visited daily by staff during the seasonal and is monitored remotely.

This project will support multiple investment principles, City values and Strategic Priorities. During the pandemic it has become clear that public parks and related activities are vital to a healthy community. The Discovery Meadows splash pad is a free activity that can be offered to the public throughout the summer season and was sorely missed during the 2020 season. As a result, staff made a significant effort to make sure the asset was available to the public this season. Unfortunately, aging system elements made that a challenging task. Keeping this free activity available is a key equity/inclusion component in the suite of amenities our park system can offer. With the proposed renovations, staff time on demand responses and daily monitoring can be minimized, thus increasing the staff's capacity to perform other maintenance tasks in the park system.

Library HVAC Replacement

Project Overview

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This project is to fund needed updates to the Library HVAC system. The current HVAC system is over 40 years old and regularly requires maintenance. The maintenance can be expensive and difficult due to the age of the equipment and difficulty in finding parts. The issues make for low air quality and unworkable temperatures at times. As a public building and a warming and cooling shelter it is important to the community that the HVAC is in good working order.

• Engagement & Inclusion

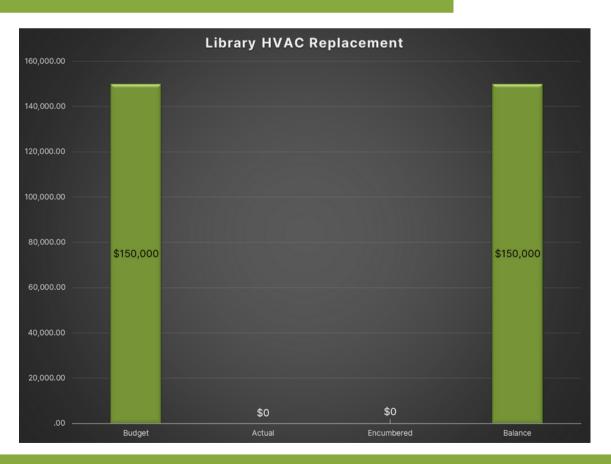
The library is open to everyone in the community. These improvements will make for a more welcoming and usable space for all visitors to the library.

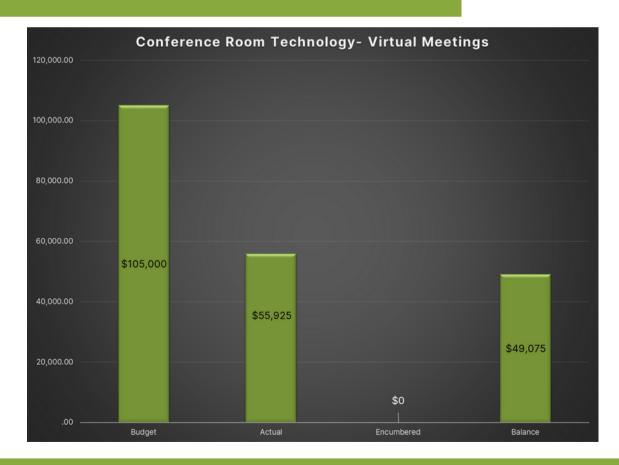
Conference Technology

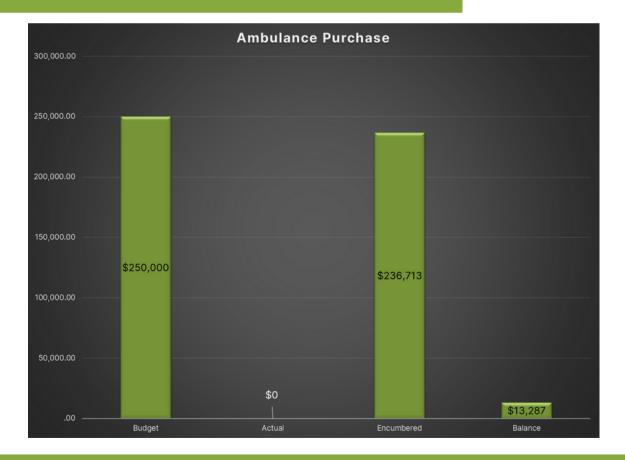
Ambulance Replacement

Municipal Court Case Backlog

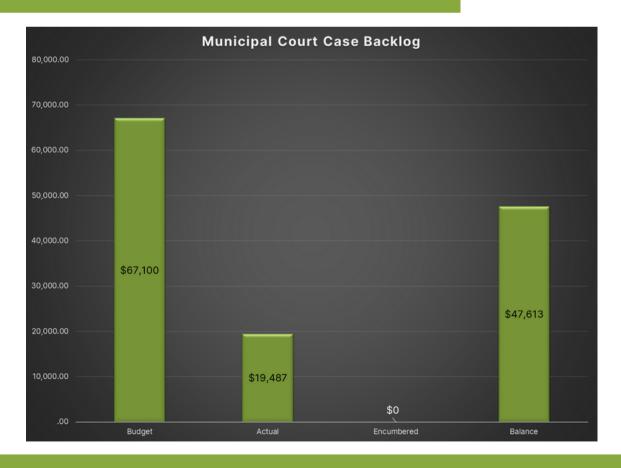
Project Overview

This project will implement COVID-19 safety measures to facilitate court operations, expand current staffing model to increase the speed of case resolution, and address the backlog of case counts and projects due to pandemic.

The court was not able to operate safely for court appearances from March until May of 2020 (during the pandemic) which means that fewer cases were able to be processed each court session.

These combined issues created a back log of court cases. The proposal is to expand court appearances from 4 days per month to 5 for one year.







Park Maintenance Fleet & Equipment Upgrades

Project Overview

This project is to fund much needed fleet and equipment replacements for Park Maintenance & Operations. Fleet upgrades will help the City adequately maintain the acreage in our park system and improve maintenance levels in all of McMinnville's parks.

To date, the City has been unable to fully fund reserves for improvements, maintenance, or upgrades, so maintenance work has been limited to available funding. ARPA's one-time funding allocation will help the City extend the life of impacted assets, improve safety and operational capacity, and modernize the fleet - which will ultimately improve the City's operational capacity.







Mobile Recreation Vehicle

Project Overview

This project is to fund a mobile recreation vehicle for the Parks and Recreation Department. Currently we use a 20+year old truck to transport our recreation equipment and supplies for our Summer Fun program, as well as other events and activities. This vehicle will make our prep time more efficient, and the branding on

the vehicle will promote our department and our city. This new vehicle would be used during the summer to help staff with over 150+

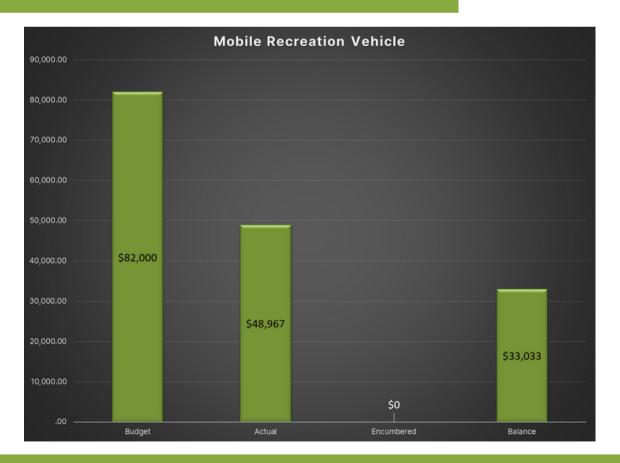
activities and events as well as events and activities throughout the entire year.

This project will support multiple investment principles, City values and Strategic Priorities. This project aligns with MAC TOWN 2032 Strategic Priority 1, City Government Capacity- Strengthen the City's ability to prioritize and deliver municipal services with discipline and focus.

This mobile recreation van will help us take recreation to those furthest from opportunity and to cut down on the barriers that people may have to access our recreation services.

With the mobile recreation van, staff time loading/unloading will be on demand responses and daily monitoring can be minimized, thus increasing the staff's use of time dedicated to recreation activities and programming.







Navigation Center

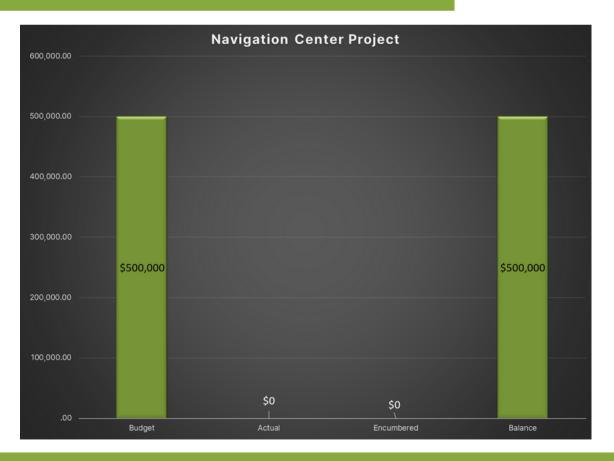
Project Overview

This is one year's worth of operating funds for the new McMinnville Navigation Center (a low barrier shelter with wrap around services per HB 2006).

In 2021, the Oregon Legislature passed HB 2006 to support emergency housing for homeless populations. One aspect of that bill was the definition of a Navigation Center (low barrier shelter with on-site services to help homeless individuals achieve stability and long-term housing) and a funding mechanism for cities to do so. As part of the bill, Representative Noble was able to secure a \$1.5 million grant for the development and operation of a Navigation Center.

In partnership between the Yamhill County Action Partnership (YCAP) and City, the planning is underway for an emergency low-barrier shelter with on-site supportive services to help people who are experiencing houselessness to stabilize and work towards achieving permanent shelter. Onsite services will be counseling, medical provisions, employment coaching, and housing case management. This shelter is a human-centered space with a trauma informed design approach. Resolution 2023-14 amends project purpose to be for operating and/or construction costs.





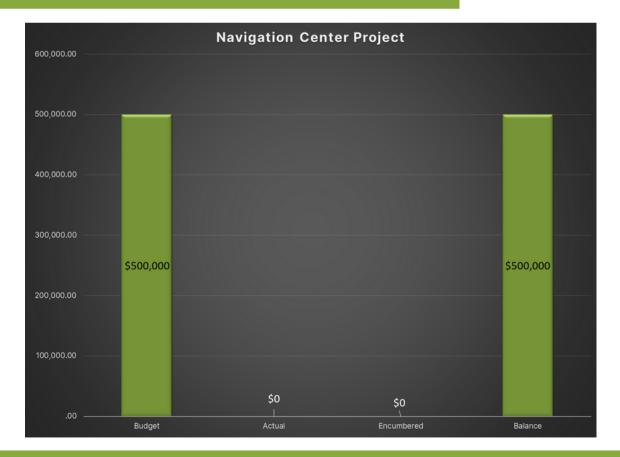


Neighborhood Parks Renovation

Project Overview

This project will renovate and improve our neighborhood parks, including the addition of 2 new playgrounds, the installation of safer, soft materials beneath play equipment, and refreshed court surface markings. These are vital improvements to our local park system.





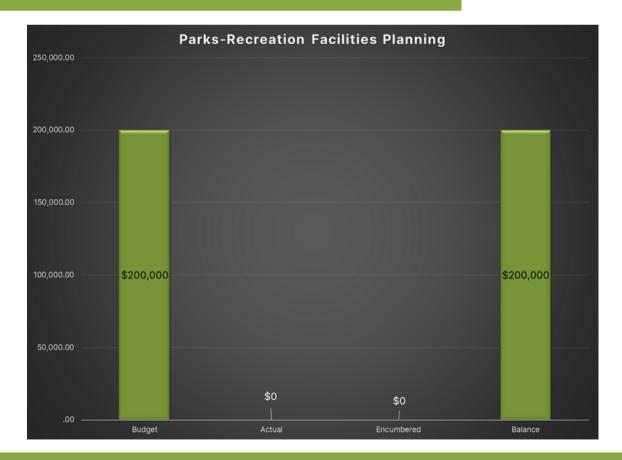


Parks & Recreation Facilities Planning

Project Overview

The Parks Recreation Facilities Plan project will engage community stakeholders in a robust and equitable process with the goal of replacing aging recreation facilities. This project will incorporate inclusive planning, address project constraints, and achieve an outcome of improved recreational facilities for our growing community.





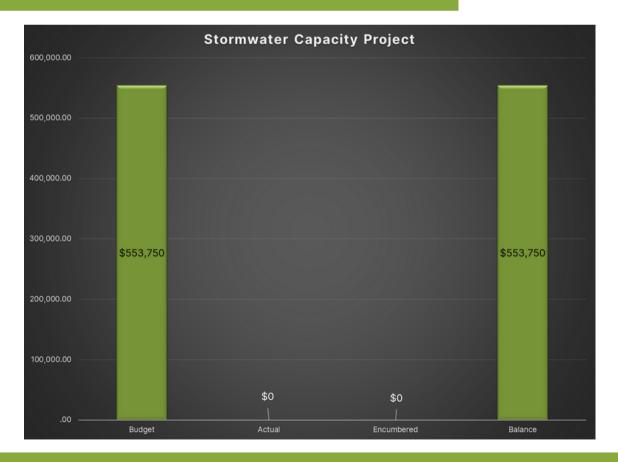


Stormwater Capacity

Project Overview

This master plan evaluates existing and future stormwater drainage needs in the City of McMinnville (City) and establishes a plan to implement the recommended improvements. This plan updates the 1991 City of McMinnville Storm Drainage Master Plan1 to address recent growth in the community and relevant regulatory developments. More specifically, this plan presents the results of the analysis of the existing drainage system, establishes performance criteria, identifies improvements designed to relieve existing problem areas or potential future problem areas, and recommends standards for the design of stormwater conveyance facilities. To the extent practical, the form and methods of the 1991 Plan have been maintained. Some methods for determining stormwater runoff and system capacity during storm events have been adjusted to reflect current available information and design practice. The proposed improvements reflect a review and update of projects described in the previous plan, along with new recommendations based on recent maintenance reports and updated land use and development data.







Stratus Village

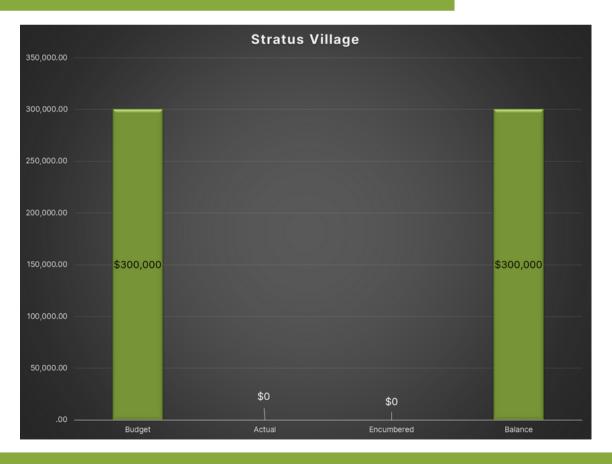
Project Overview

Stratus Village is a planned 200-unit affordable housing multifamily complex to be developed on seven acres site off Stratus Avenue. This project is intended to serve households of 80% area median income or less and will be comprised of studios, and a range of one-bedroom to four-bedroom apartments. The Housing Authority has already achieved their land-use needed to support the project and has designed a project that is compliant with McMinnville's Great Neighborhood Principles. The Housing Authority is partnering with Unidos, Virginia Garcia, Chemeketa Community College, Willamette Valley Medical Center, Department of Human Services, Worksystems, Inc., Yamhill Community Care (YCCO) and the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde on the project.

On February 23, 2021, the McMinnville City Council approved Resolution No. 2021-09 supporting the Housing Authority's Stratus Village project and their application to Oregon Housing and Community Services (OHCS) for funding. When the Housing Authority applied to OHCS for funding, they were denied in the competitive process. One of the reasons for the state denying their application was the lack of local supportive dollars in the project.

The Housing Authority would like to construct the project in two phases. The first phase of the project is approximately \$30.4M. Right of way improvements required for the project are approximately \$250,000 and infrastructure to serve the project is approximately \$5,000,000. The Housing Authority would like to request \$300,000 to help offset the right-of-way improvements and infrastructure costs of the project and to show local financial support of the project.





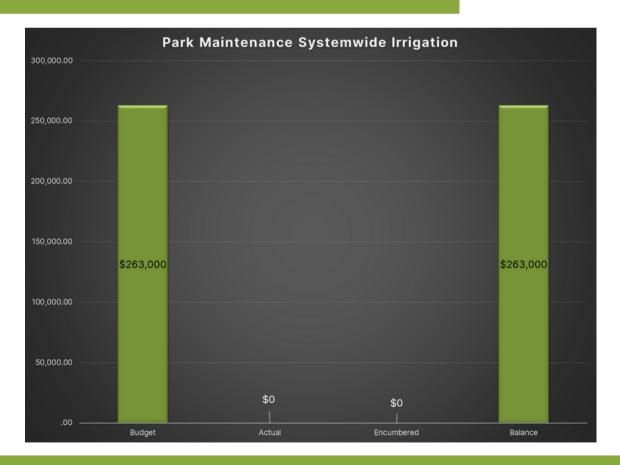


Park Maintenance System-Wide Irrigation

Project Overview

The project will fund needed irrigation system renovations in multiple locations in the park system. Work will focus on sports turf, neighborhood parks and heavily used turf stands in community parks. The value of useable, aesthetically pleasing public open space has come to the forefront as communities continue to maneuver through the global pandemic. These spaces enable our residents to enjoy each other and the outdoors in a safe manner. These projects will also address equity and inclusion values by renovating neighborhood park irrigation systems an ensuring that those impacted neighborhoods have access to quality green open space. Providing quality open space at the neighborhood level is a key par of equity and inclusion City wide. Renovating systems at Dancer Park will improve user safety relative to those athletic fields and improve the user experience. Finally, these renovations will reduce start up repairs and in-season repairs, reducing downtime and increasing the staff's capacity to address other maintenance demands.







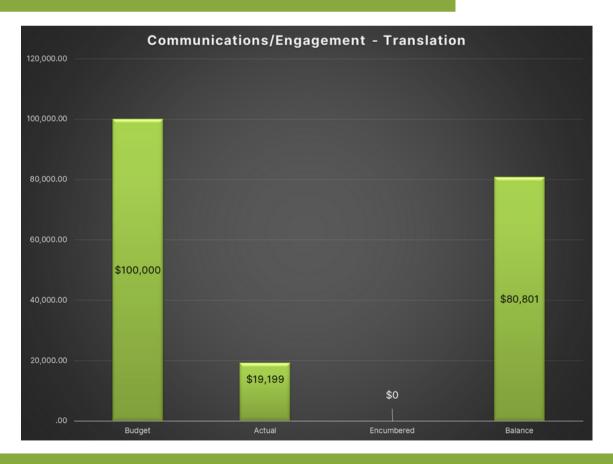
Communications, Engagement, & Translation

Project Overview

This project will serve the City of McMinnville and its residents by translating the City Code and all externally facing core service forms and applications into Spanish. Approximately 25% of the McMinnville population identifies as Hispanic. Approximately 20% of McMinnville residents do not speak English at home. Additionally, software and applications are available that will enable communication using the channels used most today – namely phones and tablets. The city has already translated some documents into Spanish and translation services are provided when requested. Shifting our communication strategy not only to translate forms into Spanish, but also to create communication tools that can be translated in real time will provide access to government meetings and engage a large portion of the McMinnville community that has limited access.

This project will also meet the City's goals to provide equitable access to all public meetings, both in a virtual environment and in person. The project's outcomes will stretch beyond basic translation of documents to include livestream meetings with closed caption subtitles in both English and Spanish. Additionally, ongoing communication through social media, websites and other updates will be instantly available in many languages using the proposed software. This project will expand economic prosperity, leadership and public engagement opportunities. The outcomes will align with city values including equity and courage with an eye on the future of our community.







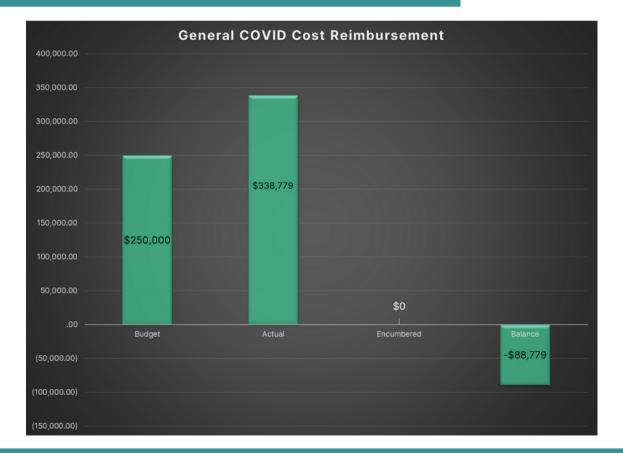
COVID Cost Reimbursement

Project Overview

These funds will reimburse costs related to COVID 19 expenditures. Direct expenses on COVID response and recovery as well as staff time have been incurred since the date eligible expenses opened for SLFRF dollars on March 3, 2021. The City has sought to maximize federal funding available for eligible costs associated with the pandemic in order to minimize the costs to local tax payers and proposes to continue to do so during the current and upcoming fiscal years.

Information Systems Security & VPN

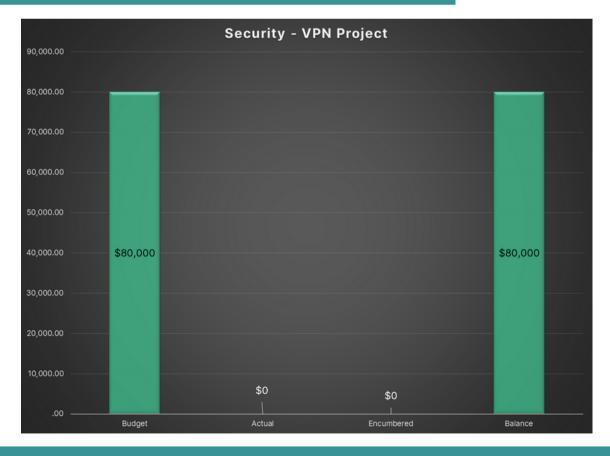
Project Overview

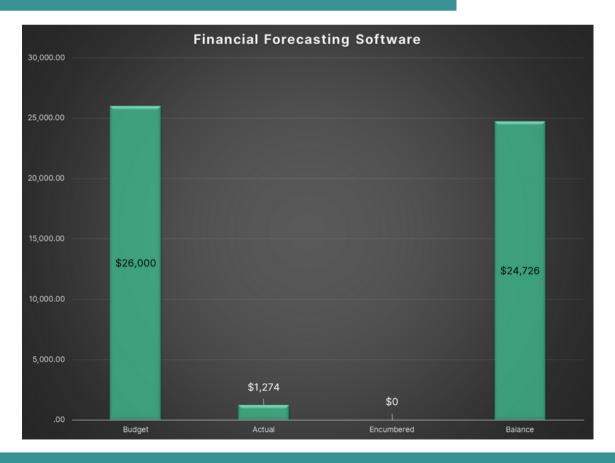
Financial Forecasting Software

Project Overview

This project is an investment in financial forecasting software that will allow for informed and efficient financial planning. It will add a financial analysis capacity for scenario modeling and longer-term financial plans into the city's toolbox. Longer term, and with additional investments, this basic financial forecasting capacity could allow us to build in equity review of how and where city resources are invested. Financial forecasting software will help determine if the City will be able to absorb the carrying costs of purchases made with ARPA funds. It will allow for more technical ability to offer transparency options for scenarios and other forecasting needs associated with the budget process and long-term financial planning.

Library Electric Vehicle

Project Overview

This project is to fund purchase of an electric vehicle for home delivery of library materials.

In the middle of the three-month library closure due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the McMinnville Public Library developed a home delivery program. The program has continued to be popular for more than 2 years, and we plan to continue offering this service to library patrons. Currently the Library uses an older SUV passed down from the Fire Department. While a great benefit at the time, the hand-me-down vehicle is not a long-term solution for Library home delivery. Further, use of the old vehicle is costly, and the costs to operate are increasing along with fuel costs.

A new electric vehicle will allow the library home delivery service to continue, while saving fuel and eliminating CO2 emissions.

ADA Inventory

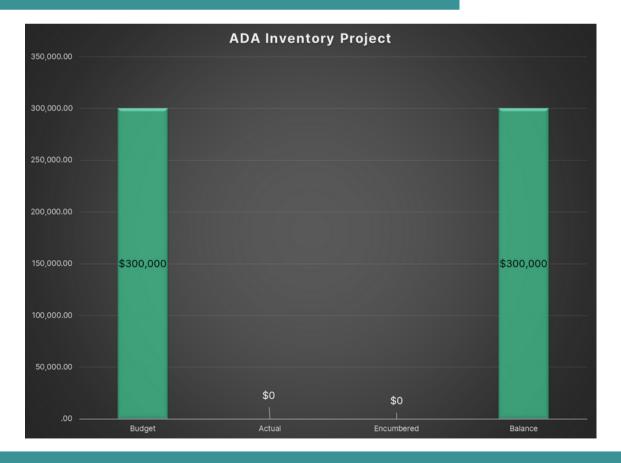
Project Overview

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Per the Federal Americans Disability Act (ADA) laws, the City of McMinnville should have an ADA Plan that identifies all barriers for access to public facilities (buildings, parks, and public right-of-way) and an implementation plan on how those barriers will be removed. McMinnville was required, as of 1992, to have such a plan, but has failed to comply. Such failure is not only a legal liability for the City, but also a disservice to the community, particularly from an equity perspective as McMinnville is not actively working to reduce barriers in its public ROW, facilities, and parks for persons with disabilities to move around the city. An ADA transition plan addresses equity issues and barriers to participation that many in the community face. Currently approximately 12% of McMinnville residents are considered disabled.

This project is an identified strategic action in the MAC Town 2032 Strategic Plan under Engagement and Inclusion. Some hit hardest by the pandemic are community members and visitors who do not have access to consistent transportation and who cannot freely move around the community, particularly to the extent that transit has been limited due to COVID restrictions.







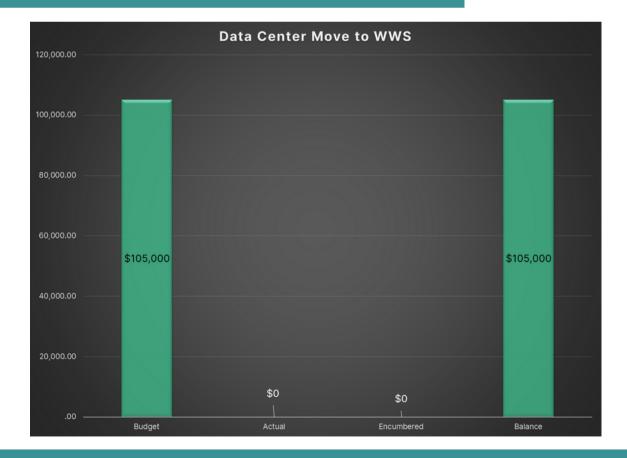
Moving Datacenter

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Project Overview

This project will move the Information Systems Datacenter from its previous location to set the City up better for the future and make this technology hub more resilient for community operations.







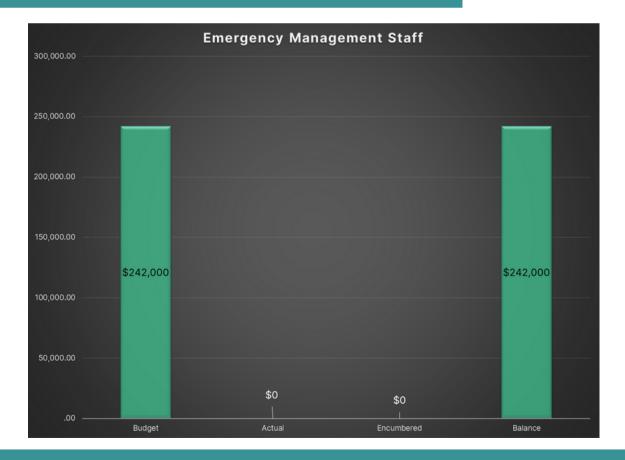
Emergency Management Position

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Project Overview

This project will fill the position of Emergency Manager for the City of McMinnville. The City of McMinnville has been without a dedicated staffer to focus on the Emergency Management issues. This would fund .5 FTE of a position to focus on this Emergency Management planning and preparation for 3 years.







Federal Grants Manager Position

Project Overview

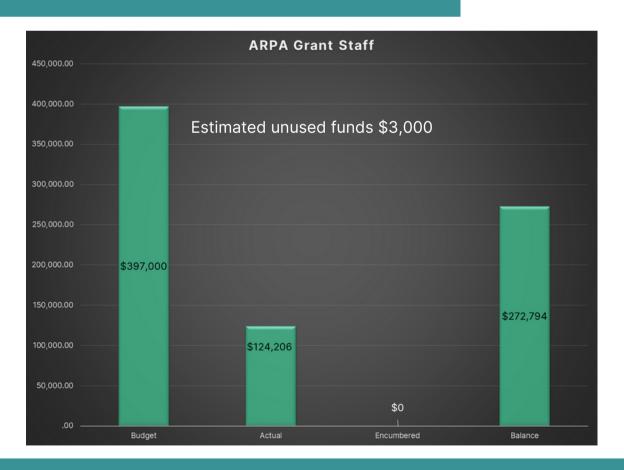
This project is to hire a full-time Grant Manager to assist in administration, tracking, engagement, compliance, and reporting activities for the American Rescue Plan Act - Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) program.

The person who fulfills this role will aid in the city's economic recovery by monitoring and guiding the process of projects to completion and evaluating outcomes ensuring efficiency and effectiveness, adherence to grant requirements and reporting standards.

The manager will start work in April or May 2022 and work throughout the grant timeline, ending in December of 2024. The manager will be assigned to the Finance Department, and report to the Director.

Regular reports to the Council and website updates as well as community engagement strategies will be deployed to promote transparency throughout the grant administration.







Municipal Court Building Remodel

Project Overview

This remodel will make building upgrades to allow more accessibility, as well as socially distanced access to the Municipal Court. In addition, it will improve security for sensitive information handled by the court. Project objective is to also create a more secure working environment for all staffers who work in the City Hall given reduced staffing levels due to remote work needs and anticipated longer term flexibility in how many staff will execute their jobs.

Innovation Center Feasibility Analysis

Project Overview

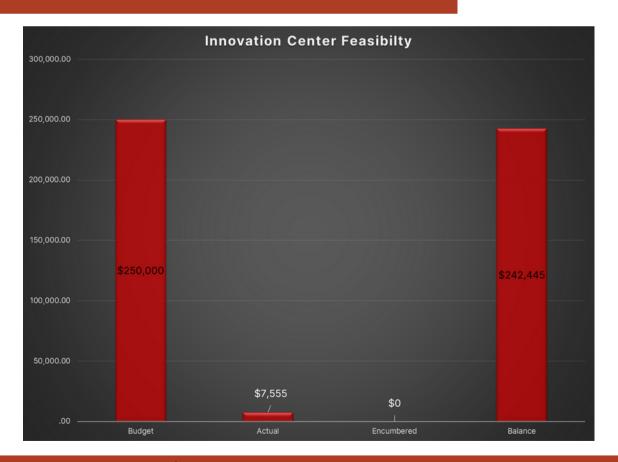
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This is a feasibility analysis of the necessary public infrastructure needed to support a Regional Innovation Campus in McMinnville on 140 acres of vacant industrial land on Highway 18 and at the former Evergreen Campus. The feasibility analysis will evaluate the type and size of broadband, water, wastewater, power and transportation infrastructure needed to serve a high-density research and development industrial/business office district. Currently, the city has only planned for the infrastructure necessary to serve a low-density general industrial user, and that infrastructure is already noted to be under capacity for even that type of industrial user. The public infrastructure feasibility analysis will allow the City to understand the public infrastructure that it needs to build to support the private development envisioned for this site, and to then leverage that knowledge to apply for state and federal infrastructure funds to build the infrastructure. Both the State of Oregon and the Federal Economic Development Agency have identified Innovation Hubs as priority economic development investments coming out of COVID. This is a priority project in terms of timeliness and the ability for McMinnville to leverage its ARPA funds for larger impact.

The development of an Innovation Center will benefit McMinnville and Yamhill County's economic development health. It will be a campus for both new and growing companies to co-locate and collaborate, share resources, and intellectual capital. It will also serve as a Class A office campus for McMinnville, which currently does not exist. The jobs created will serve both McMinnville residents and Yamhill County residents.

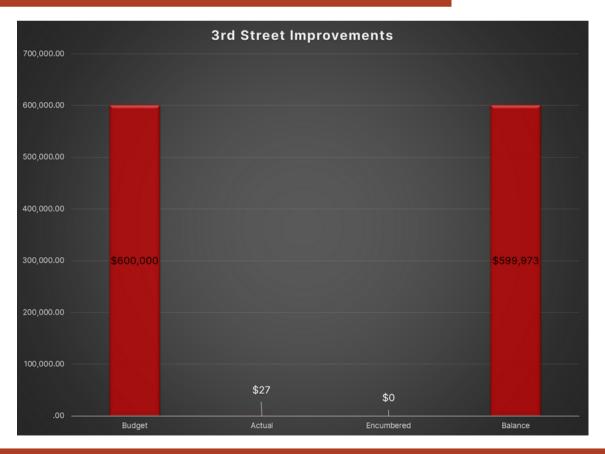

Third Street Improvements

Project Overview

Third Street is McMinnville's "Living Room". It is the heart of our business community, serving both locals and tourists who frequent the areas independently owned small shops and restaurants. It is also the epicenter where the COVID pandemic impacts crippled these businesses. Looking for ways to adapt, the Downtown McMinnville businesses learned to pivot during COVID with the successful "Dine Outside" program. As take on future planning, the design of Third Street will consider these and other needs for a future successful and resilient downtown. This project will documents for public develop construction the infrastructure improvements needed on Third Street to support the recovery and future resiliency of McMinnville's local business community downtown. These construction documents will allow McMinnville to proactively apply for federal infrastructure funds with the Federal Infrastructure Stimulus package to construct the project. The project area is approximately nine linear blocks.





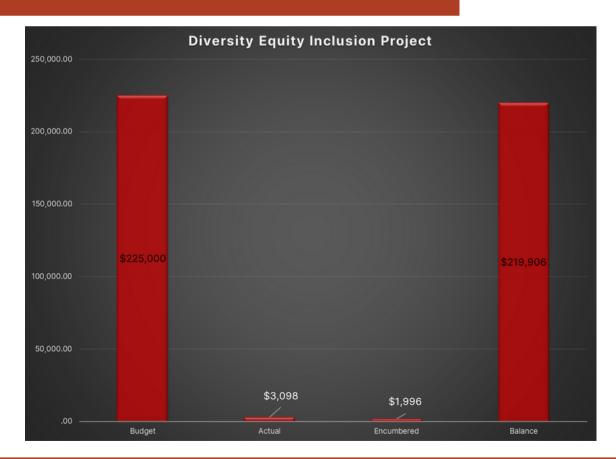


Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion

Addresses equity issues and barriers to participation that many in the community face. Investments to implement diversity, equity & initiatives. Possibly including personnel and/or consultant costs. For example, currently approximately 18% of McMinnville residents are considered disabled. This is an identified strategic action in the MAC Town 2032 Strategic Plan under Engagement and Inclusion.







First Responders for Mental Health Crises

Project Overview

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Historically those in our community who suffer from mental health crisis, homelessness, and addiction have been funneled into a public safety pathway within our community who rely heavily on first responders to triage non-criminal calls for service involving this portion of the city's population.

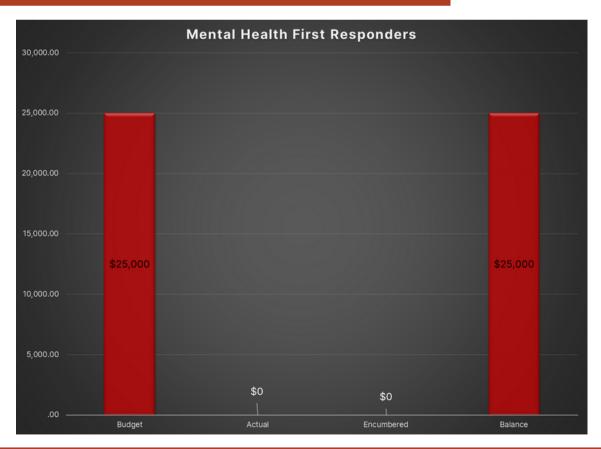
While our police department is equipped to handle some incidents, they are not necessarily the most effective at finding long term and wrap around solutions for those who are in need.

The project invests a portion of ARPA funds into a exploring how a communitybased model solution will benefit our community members who are experiencing these issues.

We believe a community-based approach will provide better long-term outcomes for those in crisis by allowing those with the expertise to take the lead and assist those who need help.

This project will begin by working with a consultant who will provide a "road map" for our community. The chosen consultant will provide information on how to create a program for a community our size, how to harness the existing programs within the county, and find new entities to partner with.







Broadband Access Technology Training

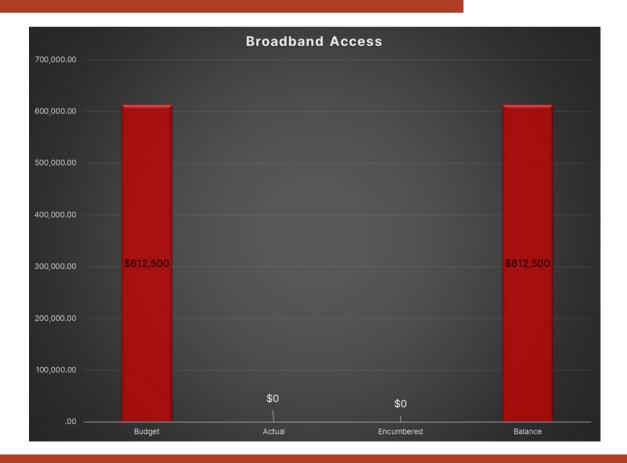
Project Overview

The three primary barriers to highspeed internet are:

- 1. Lack of infrastructure
- 2. Affordability
- 3. Knowledge of internet use

This project is intended to invest in broadband access and technology training in order to reduce these barriers. We believe the strongest impact the city could make the area of broadband is enabling community access to existing broadband. Potential partners include McMinnville Water and Light, the School district and internet service providers.

RECITAL:

Whereas, the United States federal government adopted the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA): and

Whereas, a component of ARPA allocates Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) to state and local governments which granted the City of McMinnville (City) a total of approximately \$7.7 million in SLFRF; and

Whereas, the City's Budget Committee conducted work sessions to determine how the City may use the SLFRF and these discussions resulted in the Budget Committee recommending and the City approving use of funding, in Resolution No. 2021-54, for twenty-eight (28) phase one projects attached hereto as Exhibit 1; and

Whereas, the forecast for spending needs have changed due to unforeseen financial and external factors; and

Whereas, due to supply chain issues, availability of parts, cost increases, and, for some projects, allowable contract terms through December 2026 that maximize use of the SLFRF; and

Whereas, availability of alternate funding and new directives from the State of Oregon, City organizational needs, and scope changes that meet the original intent of the approved projects in phase one.
