
Survey Objectives

- Determine the willingness of McMinnville residents to support a Bond to fund a new Aquatic Center, Library and Senior Center improvements, and upgrades to parks.
- Identify community prioritization for proposed projects.
- Identify best features of proposed projects.
- Survey <u>did not</u> identify roadblocks (ie. personal economic sentiments)



Quality of Life


 88.6% of McMinnville residents are Very or Somewhat satisfied with quality of life in McMinnville, compared to 84% in 2023 - a 4.6% increase.





Operations and Performance of City Government


59.4% of residents

 improvement.






Quality of Public Recreational and Community Facilities

- 73.8% if McMinnville residents believe that the quality of recreational and community facilities is Excellent/Pretty Good, compared to 23% who feel the quality is Only Fair/Poor – a 50.8% margin.
- 78% of residents identified as 4/4 voters believe the quality of recreational and community facilities is Excellent/Pretty Good compared to 18.6% who rate them as Only Fair/Poor – a 59.4% margin.






2024 Project Priorities





Parks Projects






After hearing more about projects, which would you give highest priority?





INFORMED BALLOT

- Given the choice, a slim majority of voters (52%) opted for the "full package", including a majority of high-propensity voters.
- Other alternative options did not gain majority support.





Recommendations

- Engagement of community around the full package.
- 52% support of full package is too low for comfort but the full package still offers the best path forward as it brings benefit to the most residents.
