PROCLAMATION

Whereas, the government of McMinnville, Oregon celebrates our local small businesses and the contributions they make to our local economy and community; according to the United States Small Business Administration, there are 30.7 million small businesses in the United States, they represent 99.7% of all firms with paid employees in the United States, are responsible for 64.9% of net new jobs created from 2000 to 2018; and

Whereas, small businesses employ 47.3% of the employees in the private sector in the United States, 62% of U.S. small businesses reported that they need to see consumer spending return to pre-COVID levels by the end of 2020 in order to stay in business, 65% of U.S. small business owners said it would be most helpful to their business to have their "regulars" return and start making purchases again, and three-quarters of U.S. consumers are currently looking for ways to Shop Small® and support their community; and

Whereas, 96% of consumers who shopped on Small Business Saturday® agree that shopping at small, independently-owned businesses supports their commitment to making purchases that have a positive social, economic, and environmental impact and 97% of consumers who shopped on Small Business Saturday agree that small businesses are essential to their community; and

Whereas, 95% of consumers who shopped on Small Business Saturday reported the day makes them want to shop or eat at small, independently-owned businesses all year long, not just during the holiday season; and

Whereas, McMinnville, Oregon supports our local businesses that create jobs, boost our local economy, and preserve our communities; and

Whereas, advocacy groups, as well as public and private organizations, across the country have endorsed the Saturday after Thanksgiving as Small Business Saturday.

Now, therefore, I, Scott A. Hill, Mayor of the City of McMinnville, Oregon, do hereby proclaim, November 28, 2020, as:

SMALL BUSINESS SATURDAY

And urge the residents of our community, and communities across the country, to support small businesses and merchants on Small Business Saturday and throughout the year.

CIVIC LEADERSHIP

Encourage a variety of leadership development opportunities to foster a culture of civic pride and involvement

Background:

ORS 294.414(1) requires a local government to establish a budget committee for purposes of acting as the local government's fiscal planning advisory committee. The committee is comprised of the elected members of the governing body and an equal number of electors of the municipal corporation (i.e., qualified voters). The governing body appoints electors to the budget committee for three year terms.

There are currently two vacancies on the City's Budget Committee. The vacancies were advertised on the City website. We received nine applications for the vacant positions.

Nine interviews were scheduled with all applicants – Lisa Pool, Cale Hughes, Debbie Harmon Ferry, John Mead, Kellie Peterson, Lisa McCracken, Maged Abo-Hebeish, Virginia Long and Meredith Maxfield. Interviews took place on Friday October 9, 23020, with a second round on October 16 and 20, 2020 with members of the Audit Committee (Mayor Hill and Council President Menke).

Mayor Hill and Council President Menke recommend the new appointments of Debbie Harmon Ferry and Meredith Maxfield to a 3-year term.

Recommendation:

The Audit Committee recommends that City Council appoint the candidates noted above.


