Report in Brief: This memo is intended to support the City Council and McMinnville Urban Renewal Board's 3rd work session for the Third Street Improvement Project.

Jason White, Principal of BKF Engineers and Matt Arnold of Toole Design, the project consultants, will give an update on Phase D (Preliminary Engineering). Over the last several months, the Project Advisory Committee (PAC) and Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) determined the need to increase flexibility in the design to accommodate a range of civic and commercial uses. This presentation will focus on the Preferred Flexible Design (including the curbless approach) as well as considerations for public art and wayfinding. The results of a recent Community Forum and Survey will be shared as well.

30% Milestone Overview: 30% is a key milestone in roadway projects – it's a turning point where the basis of design (which includes a more refined cost estimate) has progressed enough to make key decisions. It is also typical to submit for outside (State or Federal) funding at 30% - 60% design. Typically, projects with more progressed designs have greater odds for successful outside funding.

Discussion: As of the last work session on July 23, 2024, the consultant was applying all the input the community had provided in terms of the cross-section, design elements,



furnishings, fixtures, etc. into the design for Third Street. In particular, the consultant was getting ready to prepare the 30% design plans for the project.

During the 30% design process, a fundamental question arose at the Project Advisory Committee: Would the design be flexible enough to accommodate a range of uses over time? Would it be able to handle outdoor dining, pop-up retail, parades, temporary art installations, etc.? And,

because this in a 50 plus-year investment, would the design be able to accommodate future events that the community hasn't yet imagined?

With increased flexibility in mind, over the last several months, the consultants worked with the Project Advisory Committee and Technical Advisory Committee to adjust the project's conceptual design. With their input, the consultants have made some significant changes to the Third Street design, but these changes remain consistent with the project's Vision, Goals, and Objectives. This presentation and discussion will review the Preferred Flexible Design Concept.

We will also share the results of a recent Community Forum and survey. which was open from November 18 to December 13, 2024, and the 12.03.24 Community Forum.
